The Clapham Park Neighbourhood Forum was set up to provide a constructive forum for residents to voice their views on any specific problems or issues affecting their local neighbourhood, to put forward ideas for community improvement to support local community activity.

The forum has been involved, over the years, in discussing proposals for a new schools at the Glenbrook site, encouraging residents to participate in the consultation on a potential Controlled Parking Zone in the area, seeking residents' ideas to be fed into the local 'Our Streets' programme, developing an input to Lambeth's Local Plan and enabling scrutiny of the new Masterplan for the regeneration of the Clapham Park Estate.

A recent forum responded to concerns about the growing level of violence amongst young people. That meeting led to action to publicise activities in which local young people could be involved and to securing a small grant from Lambeth Council to fund additional activities in the area. Because of the Covid-19 lockdown, there have been delays in bringing this forward.

The Forum has also provided support to the local Over 50's Lunch Club and Coffee Morning, the Clapham Park Community Fun Day and the Friends of Agnes Riley Gardens including raising funds for the community garden and to repair the paddling pool.

#### Donna C Henry MBE, Clapham Park Project Board Member 2000-2020

Donna C Henry MBE, CPP's chair who has died suddenly aged 66, was one of a group of fellow residents, including Sue Bowman MBE; Oliver Higgins; Charlie Kennedy and Julia McFadden amongst others, who worked hard in the late 1990's to bring the social, economic and housing problems of the Clapham Park estate to the attention of Lambeth council. They persuaded the council to choose Clapham Park as its New Deal for Communities (NDC) area which would attract significant amounts of Government investment. They were successful and the Clapham Park Project was established in 2000 as the NDC organisation for the area. Donna joined the board of CPP, soon becoming vice-chair and, in 2005, chair. She held that position conscientiously for 15 years until her death. By then, she had steered CPP's transition to the charity status it has today.

As Clapham Park residents will know, much of the NDC investment went into upgrading the housing stock with the estate being transferred from the Council into the control of a resident-led housing association later absorbed into Metropolitan Thames Valley Housing Association. As well as her work for the CPP, for some time Donna sat on the board of the estate's housing association. She devoted herself to ensuring that the regeneration programme would remain true to the community's vision for the area. In 2011, Donna's work was recognised when she was appointed MBE.

Although Donna lived in Clapham Park for several decades, her roots lay elsewhere. She was the eldest child of Gwen Lindo and Kenneth Mills, and was born in St Kitts in the West Indies, and spent her early childhood there in the care of her grandmother. At the age of eight she moved to join her mother in north-west England, settling in Oldham. It was from there that she moved to London to work as an ophthalmic nurse, eventually settling in Clapham Park. She had two children, Malana and Tshan, and married Kenneth Henry in 1988.

Donna was totally dedicated to the wellbeing of the residents of Clapham Park – The estate development project was not without its setbacks, not least repeated delays in funding. The financial crash of 2008 was a blow to the estate's ambitions. Some aspects of the regeneration were not entirely successful; and Donna was personally affected. But through all those vicissitudes, she remained hopeful of eventual success, maintaining her sense of humour and good spirits. She was a well-known figure in Clapham Park. She will be sorely missed.
